Michael D. Turner

Mr. Turner was appointed Director of BIS Office of Export Enforcement in February 2005. In that position he is the senior law enforcement officer in BIS, directing and overseeing world-wide investigations of export control violations. Mr. Turner has 25 years of experience as a federal law enforcement officer, beginning with assignments as a special agent with the Air Force Office of Special Investigations in 1980. In 1983 he joined the U.S. Customs Service, where he held positions including Supervisory Special Agent in Detroit and Director of Customs Strategic Investigations in Washington, DC. Mr. Turner was appointed to the Senior Executive Service in August 2000 as the Regional Special Agent in Charge of the Customs Office of Internal Affairs in Los Angeles. In January 2003 he was appointed Special Agent in Charge with the Department of Homeland Security, U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), in San Diego, California. Between June and December 2004, Mr. Turner was temporarily assigned as the Special Agent in Charge of the ICE office in Phoenix, Arizona. He received a Bachelor of Arts degree in Criminal Justice from Michigan State University and is a graduate of the inaugural class of the Customs Leadership Institute at Columbia University. His wife, Pamela Caudill, is a Special Agent in Charge with the State Department's Office of Inspector General in Washington, DC.

Robert Clifton Burns

Mr. Burns focuses his practice on international business transactions, export controls, economic sanctions, customs and international intellectual property matters. His clients are principally in such high-tech industries as lasers, software, medical devices, telecommunications, B2B and B2C ecommerce and military equipment. He advises clients on international sales, cross-border distributorships, licenses, joint ventures, and mergers and acquisitions, along with notifications under Exon-Florio and Hart-Scott-Rodino. In addition, Mr. Burns represents clients in international arbitration proceedings. His export control work encompasses the Export Administration Regulations (EAR) administered by the Department of Commerce, the International Traffic in Arms Regulations (ITAR) administered by the State Department and the country-based economic sanctions program administered by Treasury's Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC). Mr. Burns also develops compliance programs for these regulations, conducts due diligence for compliance with them, and submits voluntary disclosures of prior unlicensed exports. His customs work includes registration and enforcement of intellectual property rights with the Customs Service and release of seized merchandise. Mr. Burns is currently an Adjunct Professor of Law at the Georgetown University Law Center. He was Editor-in-Chief of the Northwestern University Law Review and a law clerk for the Honorable Robert A. Sprecher on the United States Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit.
